Message from the Pastor

The Romans had a saying: money is like seawater; the more you drink, the thirstier you become.

St. Augustine said, "By the grace of Christ the day is now at hand in which we are to gather in the harvest, and, therefore, should be thinking about returning thanks to God who gave it, both in the matter of making offerings and rendering tithes. For God who has deigned to give the whole has condescended to seek back from us the tithe, doubtless for our own profit, not God's own." (Augustine, A.D. 430)

An ancient Jewish rabbi developed an understanding about levels of giving called, The Eight Degrees of Charity. The first degree is to give, but with reluctance or regret. This is the gift of the hand, but not of the heart. The second is to give cheerfully, but not proportionately to the distress of the sufferer. The third is to give cheerfully and proportionately but not until solicited. The fourth is to give cheerfully, proportionately, and even unsolicited, but to put it in the poor man's hand, thereby exciting in him the painful emotion of shame. The fifth is to give charity in such a way that the distressed may receive the bounty, and know their benefactor, without there being known to him. The sixth degree, which rises still higher, is to know the objects of our bounty but remain unknown to them. The seventh is still more meritorious, namely, to bestow charity in such a way that the benefactor may not know the relieved persons, nor they the names of their benefactors. The eighth and most meritorious of all, is to anticipate charity by preventing poverty; namely, to assist the reduced fellowman, either by a considerable gift, or a sum of money, or by teaching him a trade, or by putting him in the way of business, so that he may earn an honest livelihood, and not be forced to the dreadful alternative of holding out his hand for charity. (Rabbi Moses Ben Maimonides, Spanish philosopher, A.D. 1135)

Lately, we've been talking a lot about money in our committee meetings and Session meetings. Our winter expenses, being far more than were expected, have made some of us nervous. But, the reality is, we've been worrying about money here for as long as I have been here, and perhaps longer.

After studying a rolling report of the last 13 months of income and expenses here at Willow Creek, we have discovered that, on average, our weekly giving falls almost \$242 short of covering our operating expenses. Please, think and pray about the good and godly work we do together here, about the many blessings of wealth and ability you have been given, and then set an offering goal for yourselves.

Many times I have been told that the people here will come through when there is a need, like when we needed an elevator, or when one of the old boilers (that have had a small leak since I have been here) goes. And I believe that. But there is a problem with the pattern of giving to fill a need--it is very limiting, especially when we are giving to our own need.

Don't get me wrong. I love this church, it's history and it's people! And it is a very good church with wonderfully made people who love God! None of that is in question. What is at stake is our growth and continued life together. We need our finances to serve our vision, not limit it. Your enlarged offering, especially one we can plan on in the form of a pledge, will truly help us expand our care and ministry beyond ourselves. Together, may we learn to follow the commandment to love our neighbor as ourselves.

I learned to give as a child. I was given coins to offer at church when I was little. I was given an allowance as I grew up, the only stipulation being that I budget for clothing, fun, and church. My favorite superhero was Spider-Man. Peter Parker learned that with great power comes great responsibility. Likewise, I learned that because I was given so much, I was to care for others and not just myself. So, please, consider the gifts God has given you, and pledge to be a good steward: loving God and caring for others. After all, it all belongs to God.

She returned to Chicago at age 16 where she remained until marrying John Nielsen in 1945. John and Rubye eventually settled in Roscoe, Illinois, which was her home for 55 years. Rubye was employed at Sundstrand Corporation in Belvedere, Illinois for 26 years. In 2008 she moved to Pennsylvania to be close to family. Health Ministries

Recently, a local cardio-thoracic surgeon, Dr. Thomas Carter, talked about overall health and heart health. He spoke about the 2nd Law of Thermodynamics and how all systems, inevitably, will decay. That Law is applicable to our physical bodies. However, our bodies were also designed to be healthy. So, for our own good, we need to change our way of thinking...and be diligent about health...we need to choose to pursue health.

Dr. Carter listed our NEEDS (not wants):

1. Clean water
2. Exercise (aim for 10,000 steps every day)
3. Adequate rest/sleep
4. Avoid scary stuff i.e. smoking, risky behavior
5. Eat healthy food, the right stuff. Eat for health, not weight.
6. Consider adding pharmaceutical grade supplements to fight toxins and improve immunity.

Avoid bad foods (we know what they are...they look good, but are lethal!) Bad foods (high fat, salt, low fiber, processed, etc.) cause inflammation and oxidative stress inside our bodies, which in turn causes headaches, GERD (reflux,) arthritis, cancer, coronary heart disease, diabetes, and more.) When we are 20-25% overweight, we lose 10 years of life expectancy.

Consider a supplement regime that includes: a broad spectrum Multi-Vitamin, CoQ10, Glutathione, Fish Oil (Omega-3,) N Acetyl Cysteine, Milk Thistle, Tumeric, Grape Seed Extract, a Probiotic, and Vitamin D. Supplements protect and rejuvenate body cells, lower inflammation & protect our DNA from oxidative stress, detoxify & improve digestion of heavy meals, protect vital organs, lower LDL (bad cholesterol,) and lower cancer risk, just to name a few.

Giving our bodies proper fuel reduces our risk of heart death, sudden death due to heart rhythm irregularities, heart attack, and cancer risk. Good fuel also lowers triglycerides, blood pressure, and insulin resistance, while raising our HDL (good cholesterol.)

As we live in our temporary earthly bodies, let's purpose to be as strong and healthy as possible! Let's consistently choose the best fuel possible, with the food we eat and the vitamins and supplements we take. To life! Happy Spring! (Now, let's work on getting 10,000 steps every day!!)
