POSTLUDE

THE ANGEL OF GABRIEL FROM HEAVEN CAME

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Throughout Advent, we will affirm our faith using **O Antiphons.** The name comes from the Greek word antiphon (ἀντίφωνον, ἀντί "opposite" and φωνή "voice"), which is a short chant sung as a refrain. The antiphons were designed to concentrate the mind on Advent with a complex series of references from the Old and New Testaments. In Latin, the first letters of these seven images of Christ - Sapientia (wisdom), Adonia (Lord), Radix Jesse (root of Jesse), Clavis David (Key of David), Oriens (Radiant Dawn), Rex Gentium (Ruler of the nations), Emmanuel (God with us) - make up a backward acrostic, spelling *ero cras*: "tomorrow I will [come]." We are most familiar with these seven images from the hymn O Come, O Come, Emmanuel. By reciting them, we are lifting our hearts and voices in an Advent tradition that dates back to the 8th century. With the prayerful refrain "Come..." we confess our belief that Christ has come and Christ will come again, and we describe the One whose return we anticipate.
